Opening Prayer

Fr. Radmar led our opening prayer, invoking the intercession of St. Therese of Lisieux, who famously said "at the heart of every vocation in love".

Sharing of Gratitudes

We went around the zoom introducing ourselves, where were are zooming in from, our congregation, and answering the question: "What are you most grateful for in this work of vocation ministry"

Open Forum

Fr. Radmar opened up the floor for any questions, issues, concerns anyone had regarding vocation ministry. Especially since there were a couple of relatively new vocation ministers present. Three main topics were brought up:

- 1) How best to promote across genders and congregations?
 - Refer individuals to communities that fit their desires. Check diocesan websites and NRVC website (although there are more congregations outside of the NRVC family)
 - Get to know the charisms of each group.

- Perhaps we ought to consider creating a quick guide/directory of congregations names, a short description of the charism, and age of acceptance. Focus on West Coast congregations.
- Vetting is crucial! Important to conduct a prescreening before referring individuals to other congregations. If you don't think their a fit for religious life, don't refer them to anyone else!
- Consider if the individual prefers local or international congregations.
- Personal references are more effective than random referrals.
- For secular institutes, refer individuals to the office for the vicar for religious for the Archdiocese of LA.
- Encourage individuals to speak with their parish pastor or priest and begin at their home parish.
- Provide opportunities to meet other men and women discerning vocations.
- Check if individuals have received the sacraments of initiation.
- Consider age limits in the discernment process.

2) Mental Health Issues

- Keep in mind, religious life as a potential "safe space" for young people, though they may require therapy. Need to balance being a home for them without risking the community.
- Post-COVID has led to increased anxiety and isolation, with a noticeable shift in mental health.
- Importance of reading up on mental health issues and doing personal inner work.
- Clarify your community's stance on mental health conditions (e.g., bipolar, anxiety, depression, social anxiety, etc) and set boundaries on what you can or cannot accept.
- Recommended books:
 - "Emotional Agility"* by Susan David, PhD
 - "The Anxious Generation"* by Jonathan Haidt
- Addictions: What support systems are in place for individuals? Consider therapy and resources like St. Luke Institute for mental health testing.
- Keep in mind CANON 642, which states: "With vigilant care, superiors are to admit only those who, besides having the required age, health, suitable disposition, and sufficient maturity, are capable of living the life of the institute properly. If it seems necessary, they are to use experts to determine the candidates' suitability, particularly from a psychological point of view."
 - religious communities need to ensure they are accepting healthy individuals.
- Emphasized the need for education in mental health ministry to avoid jeopardizing the congregation or the church.

3) LGBTQ Issues - what to do if someone self-identifies as homosexual/same-sex attracted?

• Don't immediately discount the person. A good rule of thumb is to offer pastoral support and presume the discerner has a vocation unless proven otherwise.

- Remember, the vows are meant for both homosexual and heterosexual candidates. Both can struggle to live the vow of Chastity, and both need to be assessed on healthy psycho sexual integration.
- A key question to consider is, does the person have a genuine calling from God or not? Remember the "Gamaliel Principle" which suggests that if a movement or action is of human origin, it will fail, but if it is from God, it cannot be stopped, as opposing it would mean fighting against God (Acts 5:33-39)
- be aware of the stages of coming-out what is their primary identity?
- Is the person living with whatever the issue is in a healthy way? Regardless of sexuality. Will they be able to live in community?
